The employment of chefs and cooks is expected to grow by 11% from 2006 to 2016, faster than the average growth rate for all other occupations combined. Food service managerial jobs are expected to grow less quickly, however, with only about a 5% increase in jobs projected from 2006 to 2016. This inconsistency in the trends creates difficulties for food services professionals who are in search of good, available jobs.

"There are so many food services jobs out there that job seekers do not know about," says A. Harrison Barnes, founder and CEO of FoodServicesCrossing. "The number of jobs present on various hospitality websites far surpasses what most job seekers see advertised on most job sites.
