



Good Ideas for Finding a Managing Editor Job near you

Managing editors are responsible for the daily functioning and operations of their department. This involves planning budgets, deciding terms of contracts with freelancers, and content planning and other oversight and direct production functions. A managing editor is also a journalist who must be prepared to write original work as well as fulfill their responsibilities of editing the work of others. This role requires flexibility and excellent interpersonal communication skills because managing editors need to collaborate with other publications staff and to work effectively with freelance writers and photographers. The managing editor job is one of the most interesting [jobs in publishing](#) and is highly sought after.

To be employed as a managing editor, you will usually need several years' experience as an editor in a similar publication. You will also need to have completed a bachelor's degree in journalism or equivalent field. Experience in photography and image processing is usually highly regarded, as is sound knowledge of the main subject matter of the publication.

It can be helpful to browse job ads for managing editors even if they are [jobs with publishing companies](#) you are not interested in. Reading selection criteria can give you a clear idea of the sort of skills, experience, and knowledge employers are looking for in these positions and, if necessary, you can take steps to improve in areas you are lacking in. Online Journalism and Editor Job Sites

The Internet has made looking for [jobs in publishing](#) easier than ever before. Online job sites are an efficient way to quickly locate jobs that suit your requirements. In particular, specialist job sites which only advertise jobs in their particular field can be excellent places to source specific positions as well as great sources of career and job search advice. There are many communications, media, journalism, and even editor job sites which advertise editing jobs of all kinds. Most of these sites allow you to apply online directly to the employer from the Web site. You can find these sites by simply doing an Internet search on "[publishing jobs](#)."

Large Generalist Job Sites

The large job sites may advertise jobs across all categories, but they allow you to search by category, location, and salary and make it easy to find what you are looking for. You can also do an advanced search using keywords that target your ideal job more specifically. There is also an option to request an email job-alert to inform you whenever a new position is

advertised which meets your specific requirements. Many jobs with publishing companies are advertised on these sites so it is important to include them in your job search strategy.

Professional and Industry Journals

There are a number of state- and nationally-based journals related to the publishing industry and the journalism profession. Top employees are often sought through advertising in these publications. This is because employers know that the readers of these publications are keeping up to date in their profession and showing an interest in the industry as a whole. It is worthwhile to subscribe to a few of the most appropriate journals and to keep an eye out for advertisements for managing editors.

Newspapers

A lot of jobs are still advertised in good, old-fashioned newspapers, so do not forget to include them in your job search. At least once a week buy a newspaper which has a large employment section as well as a quality news section. Tabloids are not ideal for this. A quality broadsheet newspaper is more likely to advertise well-paying managing editor positions.

Direct Contact with Publications

You can make a list of publications you would like to work for from the Yellow Pages or Yellow Pages Online or you can purchase a book containing all the publishers in the United States. One such publication is *Writer's Market*, but there are others as well. You can find these sources by doing an Internet search. In fact, you may find Internet versions with links to the publishers' Web sites which will save you a lot of time. Publishers' Web sites will often advertise job vacancies so you can quickly see what is available. You can also email them and ask if they are expecting any upcoming openings.
