The pay is variable and depends on the business type, and size of the business you are going to work for, and how much the writers and editors come to rely on your services. Generally, the starting pay would be relatively small. And with advances in electronic media, you certainly don't need to live in New York or California anymore.

Low pay and high competition might make a publishing job search seem futile. So there is the need to set realistic goals for yourself. Why do you want one of the many jobs in publishing? The best way to look at jobs in publishing, and
