Find some [IT forums](#) and you'll realize that it is a gold mine of "geek" knowledge. The people who go to these forums love answering others' questions. They may want to show off, they may want to meet new friends, they may be doing research of their own, they may be promoting their own services, they may sympathize with you because they have been in your shoes, or they may just be generous with their knowledge. They may be all of those things. What it all means for you is that you can get high-quality answers to all your IT questions for free. You'll probably be shown plenty of free resources that you can use, too.
