Admission to veterinary school is very competitive. About 30% of current students were unsuccessful and have applied more than once. Some apply for two, three, or more years to become accepted. And, as we have discussed elsewhere in this series, about 70% of students graduating this academic year are female.

[Employment of the veterinary professionals](#) is expected to increase 35% over the 2006-2016 decade, according to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics. Faster growth has been projected for veterinary professionals who are specialists in treating cats and feline medicines while there is about equal demand for dog vets.

“New graduates continue to be attracted to animal medicine because they prefer to deal with pets and to live and work near heavily populated areas, where most pet owners live. Employment opportunities are good in cities and suburbs, but even better in rural areas because fewer veterinarians compete to work there.” says Barnes.

The CEO of VeterinaryCrossing adds, “Mostly, it is where veterinary professionals look for jobs that matters a lot while starting out their career. VeterinaryCrossing is the solution to all their problems. The site aims to list all types of veterinary jobs, as well as to provide details on career advancement opportunities and employment information related to a variety of research disciplines,” adds Barnes.

VeterinaryCrossing was launched to help veterinary professionals sort out the opportunities that they might not find out about otherwise. Unlike other job boards, the site focuses solely on veterinary jobs, and it doesn’t charge employers to post jobs.
